- 7. As indicated by Matt's email to the project mailing lists on 6 Feb, 2004 (http://groups.yahoo.com/group/imriusers/message/4756), Matt was certainly aware at that time of the open source nature of the JMRI project, which includes the DecoderPro functionality being discussed.
